SRS® Summer 2017

Hope this finds you well and that your season is looking after you.

2016 ended for us with record annual rainfall since we moved to Keith in 2005, with more than 630mm. An interesting fact, if you added the previous two years rainfall (2015 & 2014) it doesn't amount to what we received last year. The country has responded well and the stock are certainly in great condition as a result. We would be really happy with an average rainfall year to follow up.

Our Lucerne seed crops are going well considering the rainfall during summer. We have managed to have enough hot weather to stress the plants sufficiently to hopefully get a good seed set. Time will tell and we hope that the seed market stabilises following last year's record prices. The bees have been working

and the bee keepers have had an up and down summer with honey. When they have a great year the Lucerne seed crops usually struggle and vice versa.

We are excited this year to be heading to Tasmania in May for the Agfest, where we will put together a display. Our progeny are excelling in Tasmania and we see this as a potential growth area for ourselves. If your going to any of the events listed in this newsletter make sure you come and say hello.

With the livestock and wool markets going so well it is a great time to be in the merino industry. All in all we are hopeful for a great 2017.

Property update

Well what a season we have had, it is great to see what a difference it makes when we get spring rains. The country at Emu Flat has great cover on it thanks to low stock numbers due to the last couple of dry years. The rest that lower stock number has created will do the country a lot of good. Raising organic matter on the sandy soils and it also gives us an opportunity to renovate more paddocks as we don't need them to graze. We have been claying (adding clay into sandy area) for a couple of

years with great results. Following the clay spreading and incorporating we sow a crop of Saio Oats as a clean up crop then sow our pasture mix into the stubble. It is quite expensive but we are achieving high pasture density on sand hills that previously had to be managed very carefully so as not to blow away. This together with water and fence restructuring we are able to control our stocking rates on these paddocks.

We are gradually getting our paddock size down to 10Ha which is giving us great ability to manage our grazing pressure. Currently we have a mob of 570 ewes grazing a 10Ha paddock every 4 days. This stops us from over grazing and under grazing different soil types within the same paddock. It also stops the sheep from camping on sand hills protecting our pasture. Our goal is to have 30-35, 10Ha paddocks for a mob of 800 to 1,000 ewes to rotate through. This will allow for rest periods between 60 –100 days before stock are back into paddocks.

The other change that has helped us significantly in the past few months has been the purchase of a neighbouring property, Lucerne Valley. Of the 1,000 acres, 250 are irrigated for Lucerne Seed with the remainder of the property having

well established pastures. We are running all our young stock on the property, where they are thriving. Our ram hoggets are over 8kgs heavier than this time last year and our ewe



hoggets averaging over 46.5kg for the entire drop. We have mated the ewe hoggets in the hope of boosting lamb numbers. It will be interesting to see how this goes as they were only 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ months old and the rams were only in with them for 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ weeks.

Our goal, long term is to run about 2-2,500 ewes on Emu Flat and use Lucerne Valley to grow out our sale rams and replacement young stock. We also have a pasture renovation program on Lucerne Valley, where we will sow about 45Ha of new Lucerne/Chicory mix this year. Annually we aim to renovate 120Ha of country over both properties.
