Welcome to the Winter Newsletter from Kelvale Poll Merinos. We hope that everyone is travelling well and staying warm and dry.

We have had an amazing couple of rain events over the past couple of weeks following good opening rains from April and into May. The season is treating us well so far and we hope for it to continue.

Following the ram sale last year our spring rains were fantastic leading to a huge cereal hay cut (that got very wet more than once) to a massive Lucerne Hay cut that didn't get wet between cutting and baling giving great quality hay. With the spring rains and very mild summer our irrigated Lucerne just wanted to grow and grow but not flower to set seed leading to a very below average Lucerne Seed harvest. The pastures that have a Lucerne base have performed well through the summer and the stock are all faring well.

Lambing has been great with ewes having green feed through the last stages of pregnancy and into lambing. The paddocks are providing great feed and trees shelter for the young lambs . Majority of ewes pregnant with multiple lambs and they are raising them well. In March we both travelled to Canberra to attend the AGM and working forum for The SRS[®] Company. We both came away enthused about the newly formed company, options for ourselves and our clients from a marketing perspective of selling stock and wool. It certainly a work in progress and you can read more about membership options and benefits further on in this newsletter. Use of Data

ASBV data continues to be at the front of mind when it comes to objective measurement. Balance is referred to often, if you are breeding a productive merino, you need the animal to be able to do it all, not just perform well in a few traits. There are a few traits that if you push too hard on alone will have a detrimental influence on another trait. The traits that we focus on are outlined below and the reasons for our decisions.

Post Weaning Weight (PWT) – A higher PWT figure gives you good early growth. Why is this important? Early growth has many positives, including the ability for animals to reach a kill weight at an earlier age with less feed to achiever this, and positive muscle and fat will give the grower better meat yields. When looking at the females, many are starting to mate ewe lambs, early growth rates will allow for the ewes to reach a mature weight at an earlier age and therefor more lambs on the ground.

Muscle and Fat (YEMD & YFAT) – Often referred to together and both need to be positive. Our

muscle figures are going well but our fat has decreased slightly over the past couple of years due to our emphasis on wool cut. Over the next couple of years, we will endeavour to hold our wool cut but increase our fat. A challenge!

Yearling Weight (YWT) – This trait is one that we monitor and try to keep under control. If we continue to promote a higher YWT then our animals will get even bigger. We need to be careful not to breed animals that are hazardous to ourselves and the people that we employ to assist us, especially the shearers.

Yearling Clean Fleece Weight (YCFW) – This trait is particularly relevant but not much influence on our decision making. Breeding Merino sheep requires them to grow wool and we are never going to have the heaviest cutting wool sheep. If we try to do this there are many other detrimental influences on other productive traits. If the amount of wool that we cut goes up, fertility, doing ability (genetic fat) and survivability goes down. These traits are most important for production and so we need to be careful with wool weight.

Yearling Staple Length (YSL) – A trait that we have excelled in over the past 10 years and it gives us the ability to shear twice annually easily. The general health of our ewe flock has improved as they are not carrying around a large fleece whilst trying to raise a lamb. We have found that ewe survivability and lambing percentage have improved by the introduction of two shearings a year.

Yearling Fibre Diameter and Coefficient Variation (YFD & YCV) – Not much focus is put on these two traits, however we are noticing that the more influence we have on muscle and fat the more pressure we are putting on raising the micron. A trait that we are aware of but believe classing the with our SRS[®] breeding principles, we will keep the skins right to keep this under control.

These are the ASBV traits that are in line with our breeding objectives and provides a balance for us going forward.



Ram Sale Team

The 2022 Ram Sale again exceeded our expectations with a complete clearance of 210 rams. A few private selections followed the sale and we still had a few spares which meant that we had good numbers about.

This year we will endeavour to add a few more rams, we are running short of room however, we will offer 170 in the main sale with an additional 60-70 in the mini auction. We aim to keep numbers up for individual selection requirements.

With all this in mind, the rams look well. They are well grown and displaying great white wools.

good growth figures especially PWT. Another young sire is 201011. He is a solid boned ram with good early growth, muscle and fat.

The entire drop has pushed our growth, muscle and fat forward.
